"Trial by Jury."

The earliest of Gilbert & Sullivan Operas.

Was first produced at the Royalty Theatre, London, on the 1st of March, 1875.

Angelina, as Plaintiff, sues Edwin, the Defendant, for Breach of Promise. We see the Court in Session. The Jury, being highly respectable men, pay little heed to Edwin's explanations, and when Angelina appears with her heretofore—prospective bridesmaids they evince warm sympathy and even the Judge's impartiality is visibly shaken. The Defendant undertakes to marry the Plaintiff if he may afterwards marry his more recent choice, but the learned Counsel demonstrates the illegality of this. The Defendant then seeks to mitigate the claim for damages by declaring himself a worthless sot, who, when in his cups, would thrash the lady. "Let's make him tipsy and try" suggests the Judge, but the Plaintiff and her Counsel object. The dilemma then appears insoluble, but the susceptible Judge suddenly startles the Court by a triumphant solution—he will marry her himself—at which the trial ends on a joyful note. The Sword of Justice has cut the Gordian Knot by substituting the promise of a Nuptial Knot.


"Pirates of Penzance."

Was first produced at the Opera Comique, London, in April, 1880.

When Ruth, a nursemaid, was told to apprentice her young charge, Frederic, to a Pilot, she misheard and took him to a Pirate. Realising her mistake, she dared not return, so joined the Pirate Band herself as a Maid-of-all-Work. When the Play opens she is forty-seven and her erstwhile charge is celebrating his majority. He warns the Pirates that, his duty to them having expired, he must now devote himself to their extermination. Ruth implores him to marry her and take her with him. He feels he must see the World, and a few of its female inhabitants before he makes any promises, and at this moment fate introduces the family of General Stanley, a score or so of young maidens. Frederic reveals himself and begs for their pity on his plight, and one of them, Mabel, shows that pity is akin to love. They are interrupted by the Pirates who propose to add matrimony to their other adventures. General Stanley, however, arrives and to rescue his family pleads untruthfully that he is an orphan—on which the tender-hearted Pirates reluctantly release his family.

The Second Act opens in a ruined Chapel to which the General is wont to retire to brood over his falsehood. Frederic to cheer him announces that he will shortly exterminate the Pirates by means of a band of policemen who are introduced led by their Sergeant. When they retire, leaving Frederic alone, the Pirate King and Ruth enter and explain to Frederic an amusing paradox, that as he was born on February 29th in a Leap-Year his apprenticeship, which expires on his twenty-first Birthday, has still many years to run. His duty now being to the Pirates he, with great unwillingness, tells them of General Stanley's falsehood. The King fetches his band to exact vengeance and they attack and overcome the police, whose Sergeant, however, calls on them to yield in Queen Victoria's name. Their loyalty now makes them pause. Ruth then divulges that they are all, not vulgar Pirates, but Noblemen who have gone wrong. That makes a difference of course, and the Opera closes by their being accepted by the General's daughters, on their repentance, as eligible suitors.






