

Welcome



About Oliver!

The show, of course, has its origins in the Charles Dickens' novel Oliver Twist. Many attempts have been made to adapt 'Oliver Twist' for the stage, some more successful than others. There have been eight film versions, the first five made in the silent era. Lionel Bart was inspired by David Lean's film version and set out to write the musical, beginning with the song 'Where is Love?' This became the musical centre of the piece, and the premise of the whole show. 'Oliver!' opened for its first West End run in June 1960, and the subsequent film won 6 Oscars.

Oliver Twist is essentially a grim story, but one with hope. In adapting for the musical stage, with its running time constraint of about two hours and the need to inject some lightness into the general gloom, a straightforward story line has been retained, with some of the subsidiary characters discarded. The result, therefore, is something of a sugared up version, where starving orphans dream of food in energetic soprano, a nasty and vicious Fagin is transformed into a sort of loveable, but lonely, low comedy rogue, while his gang of child thieves become a troupe of dancing imps. However, Bart retains the vicious characteristics in love relationship between Nancy and the menacing Sykes.

Oliver! the musical is a heart warming tale and, not surprisingly, remains a favourite choice for schools and amateur groups throughout the land. But it is worth remembering that the London of the 1830s was a squalid and unhealthy environment for the majority of its inhabitants. In 1839 almost half of the funerals in London were of children under 10 years old. It was not unusual to find families of 7 or 8 living in one room. For many, the only chance of even a short survival was turning to crime and prostitution. Orphaned children would either suffer the fate of being put in the Workhouse, or come under the protection of characters such as Fagin and become dependant on crime. We have had an enormous amount of fun putting on this show, and we are sure you will enjoy the spectacle. However, perhaps we should remember its very real origins and never miss an opportunity to give an 'Oliver' a break.

The Story

That moment, in the Workhouse, when Oliver asks for more of the infamous gruel, must be one of the best-known moments in literature. Such audacity results in Oliver being sold, by Mr. Bumble and Widow Comey, to Mr. Sowerberry the undertaker. He escapes from this miserable prospect and meets the Artful Dodger, who takes him to join Fagin and his gang of urchin pickpockets. Despite Fagin's training he fumbles his first attempt at pick pocketing and is caught. However, his victim, Mr. Brownlow, shows sympathy and takes him into his home, where he realises that the boy resembles his own daughter, who died in childbirth. Bill Sykes, the villain beloved of Nancy, is afraid that Oliver will betray them all to Brownlow. He plans to use Nancy, who had befriended Oliver in the Thieves' Kitchen, to recapture the boy, but she, in a fit of remorse, informs Mr. Brownlow of the plot. In fury, Bill Sykes kills her but is himself cornered and shot dead. For Oliver there is a happy ending as he returns to the home of Mr. Brownlow who is, indeed, his grandfather. For Fagin, despite his amusing review of the situation, the future is uncertain and lonely.



Workhouse Gruel

Just in case you want to give members of your family the opportunity to 'ask for more', you might like to experiment with the following recipe for Gruel. This, it has to be said, is a sort of composite, gleaned from various web site sources, of a staple part of the workhouse diet in 19th Century Britain.

Ingredients per person

2 oz of Oatmeal

I teaspoon of treacle (maybe)

Pinch of Salt

Pinch of Allspice (maybe)

1 pint water (very occasionally part water, part milk)

Bring water to boil, add the other ingredients, reduce heat and simmer, stirring occasionally to prevent lumpiness. It is important for the gruel to be thin. It was usual in some workhouses for the 'big pot' containing the gruel to be left to simmer through the night.

Children were given about one pint of gruel per day, usually at breakfast, with some bread.


