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The Story

RENE, Count of Luxembourg, is an incorrigible spendthrift who has run through one fortune after another. He is now an aspiring painter in Paris, and sharing his studio with his friend, Andre Brissard, an ex pastrycook, who is now an unsuccessful painter. His girl friend and model is Juliette. The play is set at the turn of the century, and as it opens it is carnival time—a night of wild and careless merrymaking. The Count is crowned "King of Carnival". Brissard and Juliette are not amongst the revellers—they are trying to sell some paintings.

Into these festivities come three sinister characters, two secret agents and a local Registrar of Marriages. They are the representatives of the Grand Duke Basil, a Russian aristocrat, for whom they are trying to arrange a marriage for Angele Didier, an opera singer. Curiously enough Basil is in love with Angele, and yet he wishes to arrange this marriage! The explanation is that since Russian court procedure makes it impossible for him to marry a commoner, the Grand Duke is in search of an aristocrat who will give Angele his title, and after three months' pretence of marriage, allow himself to be divorced for desertion. For these services he will receive a substantial sum of money.

The man chosen for this marriage is the Count of Luxembourg, because of his financial distress. Angele is beautiful but disillusioned. She also finds the Grand Duke rather a bore, but is prepared to settle for his great title and money. She accepts the fact that she will be married with a screen between herself and the stranger who is to make her a real Countess.

All seems to be proceeding according to plan, until just before the three months expires, when Rene and Angele meet at a reception, not knowing they are, in fact, man and wife, and fall hopelessly in love with each other. The problem seems insoluble as Angele tells Rene that she is already married, and engaged to someone else. The Grand Duke arrives at the reception full of excitement that tomorrow he will make Angele his Grand Duchess.

However, into the garden sweeps an elegant stranger, the Princess Kokosov from Russia. She is looking for Basil to whom she declares she was betrothed as a girl, and "in Russia an engagement is for ever". To Basil's chagrin, she claims him as her husband-to-be, which leaves Rene and Angele free to share their love, and live happily as the Count and Countess of Luxembourg.
