

THE STORY

As he walks through Covent Garden Professor Higgins takes notes on dialects, and notably that of flower-seller Eliza Doolittle. He boasts to his friend, Colonel Pickering that within six months he could pass her off as a Duchess at an Embassy ball.

Later her father, Alfred Doolittle celebrates with his friends. Next day Eliza appears at Higgins' home to ask him to teach her to speak more genteel because she wants to become a lady in a flower shop. He agrees, but soon her Cockney mannerisms become so exasperating that he nearly gives up. She, in turn, is driven to distraction by his thoughtless treatment of her.

At last she masters correct pronunciation, and they celebrate with a triumphant dance. Although it is late at night and the housekeeper urges her to go to bed, she is exhilarated. At the Ascot races Higgins introduces her to society for the first time, and she attracts the attention of Freddy Eynsford-Hill, who follows her home hoping to see her again.

After months of hard work Eliza is ready for the big experiment, and is taken to the ball where she is an outstanding success. After the ball Higgins and Pickering congratulate each other, completely forgetting Eliza, who is hurt and angry, and rushes out of the house. Freddie is awaiting and he declares his love for her.

In the meantime her father, now famous through his philosophies, decides it is time he married the woman he lives with, and spends one last night on the town. In the morning the Professor discovers Eliza has left, and finds her at his mother's house. Returning home without her he reminisces about the way she has affected his life, and sits listening to recordings of her voice, as she quietly enters the room.
